# Together Mass for Mothering Sunday (Livestreamed)

Sunday March the 14<sup>th</sup> 2021

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## *The Gathering*

In the name of the Father, and of the Son,  
and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father  
and the Lord Jesus Christ be always with you:  
**and also with you.**

We are here today to think of mothers and motherhood in all of its complex joy. For some, today is a simple moment to be appreciated and the chance to say “Thanks”.

For others today is painfully difficult, for a range of reasons.

We are here as well to remember that Mothering Sunday is rooted in the celebration of our mother Churches, where our faith has been nurtured and is brought to bloom.

That sense of appreciation and commitment feels especially vital today, in these days when we are not able to see those we love or meet here together to worship. Today is a chance to celebrate those vital, secure, reliable, constant relationships-rooted in maternal love, rooted in this place and rooted in whichever Church we call home.

In the Bible we are told that God longs to gather us together as a hen gathers her chicks in her wings. We are here to think about God and to receive her loving acceptance, her delicate care, her eternal love.
